### CLINICAL ROLES

Services in general obstetrics and gynaecology. In obstetrics, my areas of special interest are perinatal mental health and maternity services delivery. In gynaecology, my areas of interest are uterine fibroids, menstrual disorders, vaginal surgery and outpatient hysteroscopy.

My clinical practice is underpinned by a biopsychosocial approach to medicine, and this is reflected in my academic and research interests.

I have a special interest in the interface between psychosocial factors and health care delivery. This interface includes the integration of the psychological, social and biological domains in the delivery of health care (Biopsychosocial Obstetrics and Gynaecology), and the application of psychological

and social precepts in promoting safer delivery of care (Clinical Risk Management). Health and illness are closely associated with behaviour, emotions and thoughts, and maladaptive health behaviour is an important factor in women's health.

I was Director of Clinical Audit and Risk Management, Central Manchester University Hospitals, 2002-6. Among other achievements, I established and organised the training of the first cohort of risk leads in the Trust, introduced root cause analysis of safety incidents, implemented electronic reporting and analysis of incidents, opened the first risk register in the Trust, set up and chaired the Trust-wide Clinical Audit Committee, and instituted an annual Clinical Audit and Risk Management (CARM) Fair which has since flourished.

## RESEARCH ROLES

My area of interest is health services research, particularly the organisation and delivery of women's health services to optimise the patient experience and clinical safety.

ENTER has funded education and training opportunities such as simulation training, ultrasound scan training and postgraduate degree in counselling for health professionals in the UK. It has provided seed funding for the establishment of the African Forum for Quality Improvement in Healthcare (AFRIQHER) and is supporting the campaign PROTRAIN (Promoting Thrombosis Awareness in Nigeria).

In 2016 ENTER funded the endowment of a prize at the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RANZCOG) in memory of the distinguished obstetrician, Aldo Vacca.
